Section II — The Blueprint Model

Purpose → Structure → Entry → Cognitive Flow → Interaction → Construction → Reinforcement → Logistics

This is not a checklist. It is a build order.

Layer 1 — Purpose & Intent

Define the core concept.

Write a student-facing purpose statement.

Ensure relevance beyond the lesson.

Layer 2 — Structural Frame

Sequence concepts from surface to transfer.

Align materials to conceptual development.

Layer 3 — Entry Architecture

Design meaningful entry points.

Ensure Entry Authenticity and productive struggle.

Layer 4 — Cognitive Flow

Interpret → Analyze → Evaluate → Construct

Plan pause points and friction points.

Layer 5 — Interaction Grid

Structure collaboration to deepen thinking.

Define roles and discourse expectations.

Layer 6 — Construction Zone

Require synthesis and reasoning.

Design outputs that show thinking.

Layer 7 — Reinforcement System

Include reflection and retrieval.

Revisit key ideas.

Layer 8 — Logistical Integrity

Align time, materials, and transitions to thinking.

Ensure system coherence.
